PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The City of Watseka, like many smaller central Illinois communities has been faced with a continuous economic eroding of the Central Business District (CBD) with competitive retail in outskirt developments on green field sites. The remaining CBD owners have expressed a high interest and support for combining a joint venture effort with the City to reverse this trend, using an established (owner) Real Estate Investment program in concert with a (City) completely renovated streetscape along the Route 24/1 (Walnut Street) parkway through the CBD.

Additionally, the infrastructure deterioration of the sidewalk paving and pedestrian/street light system warrants replacement at the present time. This deterioration is coupled with non-compliant ADA issues along every Route 24 pedestrian corridor. The ADA issues are currently being considered by the City for remedial action.

The lighting system was recently analyzed by a systems evaluation report, prompted by the impending December 31, 2006 termination of the existing City lighting franchise agreement with Ameren CIPS. This evaluation study recommended the replacement of the existing system prior to December 31, 2006, therefore implementation of the Streetscape Project in 2006 is essential to cost-effective community investment. It is understood that the extent of the lighting replacement system extends beyond the limits of the streetscape enhancement grant and that the pedestrian/street lighting along the Route 24 corridor is not grant eligible.

The Project Limits are from the Union Pacific railroad tracks to the east right of way (ROW) of 5th Street including all side street sidewalks to the limits of the radius termini of the side streets as shown on the attached exhibits.

The Streetscape Project will entail saw cutting and replacing the monolithic curb/sidewalk detail and replacing the sidewalk area from this joint to the existing building face or ROW line with: a new barrier curb, distinct sidewalk paving (colored concrete with geometric score pattern and shot blasted surface), ornamental pedestrian lights, street furniture (benches, trash receptacles, bike parking, mid-block fencing, etc.), tree and flower plantings in raised curb details and planter boxes, ornamental bollards, tree guards and grates, and other enhancements. All pedestrian ways will be ADA compliant. The anticipated improvements are depicted on the attached exhibits and detailed preliminary cost estimates included herein.

With the 2006 construction schedule need for replacing the existing pedestrian street light system, this streetscape enhancement in 2006 is very timely.

Recognizing the conflicting needs for maintaining vehicular traffic through the CBD with pedestrian access necessity to the businesses, minimizing these conflicts and maximizing safety is furthered by the proposed intersection design that reduced pedestrian travel distances across both Walnut Street and the side streets. This result avails vehicular green time for both Walnut and the side streets.

The City Council has adopted a Council Resolution of Support, also enclosed in this section.



Funding sought for Watseka street scapes project

The City of Watseka will work to get funding for a street scape project.

That was one of the decisions made at last week's Watseka City Council meeting.

The council hired Daily and Associates, the engineering firm from Champaign-Urbana that it uses for such projects, to do the work for \$12,000.

Watseka Mayor John Weidert

said there is an urgency to getting the work done, because the deadline for the grant application is nearing.

There is a grant through the federal highway bill that has a deadline in August. That funding would help pay for a lot of work in the downtown area to have places for people to sit, some landscaping, and other amenities. The council conducted a public meeting June 15 to glean ideas from residents

about what they would like to see with such a project.

"If we don't get a grant, we probably won't be able to do it," Weidert said, noting that the application process is very important.

The city is also working on a street light project, which also has a deadline of sorts.

AmerenCIPS has told the city that the street lights downtown are not in good shape and must be replaced. If the city does not get the project completed, the utility will do so.

Daily and Associates will do the work to get the application completed and turned in on time. In the meantime, Weidert said, there will be more dialogue needed with the community to glean more information for the project.

The council agreed that if the application is not accepted for the grant this year, the work done this year can be used to apply for grant funding again next year.



Street scapes options discussed in Watseka

The City of Watseka will continue to pursue street scapes options for the downtown area.

Alderman Dennis Cahoe, chairman of the city's Public Buildings and Grounds Committee, welcomed the audience members at a public meeting at the Watseka Public Library.

"The purpose for this meeting is for ideas from you, the public, to have a better looking downtown," he said.

"Watseka is fortunate to have a business district such as we do," he said. "I believe Watseka has one of the finest hospitals in the state with excellent doctors. We have excellent police and fire protection. We have great parks and ball parks for all age groups, and a very nice swimming pool and park," he said. "We also have a great library and excellent money institutions.

"As of figures from 2003, over 24,000 cars per day traveled through Watseka on Routes 1 and 24," Cahoe said. "Such a large volume of traffic represents a largely untapped resource that can be exploited

with proper marketing. The city and businesses must create a cohesive look to the downtown area that will serve as an invitation to the local resident an the passersby. This look should include attractive sidewalks, store fronts, and possibly decorative street furnitures and street lights. But, it all costs money."

Grants are available, he said. Those grants are through the Federal Highway Bill and administered through the state department of transportation.

Because U.S. 24, the main street of the downtown business district, is a federal highway, the department of transportation would have to approve the planned work, said Thomas B. Jordan, executive vice president of Daily and Associates, Engineers Inc.

Jordan gave an overview of some of the plans his firmhas put together and worked on. They include such places as Green Street and Campustown in Champaign-Urbana, the Village of Ivesdale and the City of Chenoa.

He showed slides of the business district in Watseka that were taken just Monday by his firm.

Some street scapes include places for people to sit and relax. There could be parking spaces given up, he said, to allow for pedestrian areas. That decision, he said, should be a public one though.

"Usually for business people the number one priority is parking," he said.

Jordan also noted that there are places downtown where some thought and money have been spent. The sidewalk in front of the Atrium Building is one such area, he said. "If you choose to do street scapes I think that the investment made here should be respected and transitioned in and out of it," he said.

There are various ways the street scapes could be accomplished, he said. Visioning is needed to help decide what actually should be done. That takes input from a wide variety of people, he said.

The council has discussed a street light project, too, which also needs to be considered, said Alderman Marvin DeLahr. That project has a timeline because AmerenCIPS has told city officials that the lights downtown are in need of replacement and that replacement must be done by December of 2006.

There is about \$75 million left of the Illinois
Transportation Enhancement Grant money. That application is due Aug. 1, Jordan said. The grant application
process is highly competitive.

There was some concern about whether or not a proper application could be presented by that time.

Engineer Larry Johnson and Jordan said their firm could do the work for the city by that time. The city in turn, Jordan said, would have to continue to have focus groups meet and help with input on how the project will continue

Toward the end of the meeting it was decided that Daily and Associates would present a proposal to the Watseka City Council at its Monday night regular meeting on getting the grant application presented by Aug. 1.

In the meantime, Mayor John Weidert said the city is in need of input from the community. It is hoped that more groups like the one meeting last night will get together for more discussions and input.


Jordan said after the meeting that the community seems to be behind getting something done. "This is a great group," he said, noting that there was commonality, interest, enthusiasm and respect for each other.


Weidert said, "We fully want to involve the community and find what a consensus is." The major consensus, he said, is probably what will be put into the application.

"This is the beginning of the process," Weidert said, noting that the council wants to have opinions from a lot of different people in the community.







City of Watseka - Central Business District Streetscape Project




EXISTING CONDITIONS











